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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Kanchrapara (medieval name is 'Kanchanpalli' or the 'golden village'), which is proud as Lord Chaitanya visited the place in his lifetime (the place is one Kilometre away from the College).

It is the last part of the stretch of civilization of Bengal before British rule and also before the birth of Kolkata, situated in the banks of Ganges. Kolkata is 49 Kilometres away from Kanchrapara and the distance of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose international airport is 40 Kilometres.

After the war of Plassey (the site is 60 Kilometres away from Kanchrapara), colonial growth was finally established in this part of Bengal and Kanchrapara became the epicentre of industrial production system with particular reference to engineering industry as basic industry, jute industry in both banks of river Ganges and ultimately Kanchrapara railway workshop was established before independence, where workers' strength is 10,000 now, turning the place into a miniature colourful form of Mother India.

- After independence of India, and also during Bangladesh war of independence there was heavy refugee influx as international border with Bangladesh is only 45 Kilometres from here.
- Still there was no higher educational institutions to cater the needs of the following strata of the surrounding society:
 - 1. Traditional local indigenous communities of all religions
 - 2. People from all over India as industrial workers.
 - 3. War-ravaged young boys and girls from Bangladesh as refugees (in terms of international law as accepted by both UNO and Government of India).
- So in 1972, the local MLA, who was also a teacher of adjacent high school, Shree Jagadish Chandra Das took initiative by virtually begging money or each and every articles from the local people to build college building, and land being donated by the local Municipality. Kanchrapara College was established in 13th November 1972. It was inaugurated by Chief Minister of West Bengal, Shree Siddhartha Shankar Roy.
- We are delighted that Dr. Anjan Roy Choudhury (Asst. Prof., Durgapur Govt. College, W.B.) has become president of the governing body from 2021, giving leadership from his philosophical vision and taking decision in relation with the practical needs of the contemporary society and institution itself.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

However, the college also ensures that the syllabus is delivered effectively through a carefully designed Master Time-Table, an Academic Calendar, and individual Academic Plans made by each department.
- Academic Sub-Committee helps the departments as well as the institution as a whole to monitor all academic activities with rigour and efficacy.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the college is instrumental in shaping the academic year

and devises a strategy that covers teaching-learning processes, and evaluation methods. This body is also responsible for introducing add-on/Value-added courses in the college.

- The college fosters an environment of academic diversity by offering various Add-on Courses. These courses are provided by the different departments of the college and also in collaboration with an institute Bajaj Finance, which covers a wide range of topics. 35 add-on courses were completed during the last five years.
- Students engage in various project works, and field work to enhance their understanding of their course of study. The college also emphasizes on issues related to gender equality, and human rights in the teaching-learning process.
- Beyond academic confines, the NSS orchestrates various character-building ventures throughout the year. - The college encourages the students to participate in games and sports through the Sports and Cultural Subcommittee. The College organizes Annual Sports every year in its own playground. Cultural events/competitions are conducted by Cultural Subcommittee.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

The curriculum is normally developed by the University of Kalyani on the basis of the recommendations of subject experts as per the local, national and global requirements. There is no direct authority of the Kanchrapara College in this process. However, some teachers from the College as members of Board of Studies are invited to offer suggestions to competent authority which are usually considered in decision making related to curricula framework. Extra-curricular activities like excursions, Departmental seminars etc. are included in the curriculum of the college.

Preparation of academic calendar and class routine at the beginning of the session so that students, teaching and non-teaching staff remain aware of the upcoming events. Further, it was displayed on the College Website, providing tentative dates for the commencement of sessions, internal examinations, holidays according to the Government of West Bengal Holiday List and institutional events like College Foundation Day, Annual Sports Day, Annual Prize Day and so on. It was only during special circumstances, like Covid-19 Pandemic, that there was divergence from it.

Regarding effective implementation of the curriculum are important to be noted down.

It is delivered to each student immediately after his/her admission.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The Kanchrapara College offers 21 programmes in which each and every issue such as civic sense and responsibility, gender, environment, sustainability and human values are addressed. Naturally, each teacher integrates all these issues as a part of their teaching -learning process. In the traditional faculties like Arts, Science and Commerce, all these aspects are practically addressed. While teaching the prescribed syllabus institute arrange various activities and programmes to address the cross-cutting issues such as:

Professional ethics: In commerce and management professional ethics are inculcated with the subjects like Insurance, Fundamentals of Entrepreneurship, Accountancy, Mercantile Law, Business Environment and Business Communications. Communication and soft skill have place in many of these courses. Professional ethics are also integral part of curriculum in all programmes. In Commerce faculty, business skills, multifaceted economic and commercial values are incorporated among the students. There is a compulsory paper of Environmental Science in which a detailed project report is prepared based on the surrounding area.

Gender Issues: Reservation policies, constitutional provisions especially for women, visit to the court are covered in Political Science, Sex ratio, education of child mortality, water scarcity, drought, flood, pollution, urbanization and modernization and village surveys are practically exhibited through Geography, Gender issues in History, Demographic issues in Economics. In the literature of Bengali, Hindi and English gender issues are tenderly revealed to the students. The issues of gender equality are best portrayed in poetry, drama and novels such as Pride and Prejudice. In addition, Cells organize seminars and conferences to deliberate on gender related issues. The NSS engages in community outreach programme such as teaching of underprivileged kids and enabling women from the slums around the campus to make a living from their cottage industry skills.

Apart from these issues included in the syllabi of affiliating university, our college has taken the various steps to inculcate these issues among the students. NSS Unit of the Kanchrapara College actively participate in the national flagship programmes and address cross-cutting issues at community level. The Kanchrapara College organizes enough lectures on the hygiene and sanitation to create awareness about health in girl students.

Human values: Human Values are covered in curriculum of political science, Economics, History, Geography, Bengali, Hindi, English and B. Com program. Further, Human values are fostered through NSS activities like distribution Oxygen cylinder, sanitizer, food and mask during the Covid-19 and donation of clothes, books, stationeries during the period of puja vacations.

Environment and Sustainability: Political Science Fourth Semester, 'Global Politics and Issues since 1945' which focuses on climate change, global warming and depletion of natural resources. Six semesters, 'Dilemmas in Politics' students take an ethical approach to environmental problems and encourage them to focus more on interaction between humans and the natural world. Environment and Sustainability are addressed in CC, SEC, and GE Courses in some disciplines like Botany, Geography, Chemistry, Economics, Microbiology, and zoology. Course curriculum also includes AECC Environmental project, a compulsory paper for all students. Students will be sensitized towards various environmental and ecological issues thereby considering their responsibilities to secure ecosystems, stop deforestation and restrain practices that are accelerating environmental disruption.

So, the Undergraduate courses of Arts, Commerce and science and M.A. Hindi, the students get acquainted with the most essential five ethics namely Environmental Ethics, Women Empowerment, Professional Ethics, Sustainable Development and Human Values.

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

- 1. Teaching-learning methodologies are evolved according to the scope of the syllabus structured by the affiliating University.
- 2. The chief method of dissemination is through class-room lectures. Lectures are always interactive sessions and the teacher encourages all levels of learners to promote an environment of participative learning.
- 3. Power Point Presentations customize the lesson according to the needs of the learners. The texts/topics are made lively through photographs, diagrams and graphics wherever applicable.
- 4. Tutorial and practical classes are designed to help out students in writing answers and conducting experiments.
- 5. In both Science and Arts subjects, students are taken on field trips, excursions, expositional tours, social work programmes to apply their class room knowledge and acquire hands-on training/experience.
- 6. Many of the Core Courses in the CBCS syllabus requires Project work and the student is trained in decision-making, analytical assessment and report-writing based on real -time facts.
- 7. Regular seminars and workshops are organized to keep students updated, broaden their outlook, enhance their communicative skills and induce critical thinking in them.
- 8. Students are encouraged to undertake self-study in the form of writing assignments and paperpresentations under the guidance of teachers. The PG students of Hindi departments also undertake summer projects.
- 9. Competitive Examination Facility: Students are offered with 48000 questionaries involving Mathematics and Reasoning for their self-evaluation process.
- 10. **Students' Profile Mapping**: It involves creating a comprehensive overview of individual student characteristics, academic performance, and personal attributes to facilitate personalized education strategies and support.
- The College has dedicated computer labs and smart class rooms which are widely used by the teachers for teaching as well as giving hands-on exposure to many aspects of the course.
- Each Science and Commerce Department is furnished with dedicated computers used for teachinglearning, for preparation of lectures and customized study material. Arts department has small cubicles and laptop
- Power Point Presentation through Overhead LCD Projectors is a common practice in all departments of the College.
- 1. The College Library is on the way to becoming fully computerized
- 2. Library is partially automated through the open source software 'KOHA'.
- 3. The library is connected with all Departments of the College through Internet.
- 4. Book search and cataloguing are all electronically done. Users can access the library through Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC).

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- The institution has a well established tradition of transparent and robust mechanism of Internal Assessment subject to the regulations of the affiliating University.
- The pre-CBCS 1+1+1 system, operational till August, 2018 had a graded system of Internal Assessment.
 - Short Class Tests were held on Mondays to assess the students' reception on selected portions of the syllabus currently taught.
 - Internal Assessment were held as per the schedule provided by the University.
 - Selection Tests were held on the entire syllabus in each discipline. Based on the results of

the Selection Tests, the students were allowed to appear for the final University Examination. This also gave an opportunity to the students to assess the level of their preparation for the final examination.

- Answer scripts were shown to the students who were counseled on a one-to-one basis and all queries met and explained by teachers to individual students.
- In the CBCS mode, the University has introduced the semester pattern. In the current system the Internal Assessment consists of Attendance, Project/Oral Presentation/Book Review/Short Format Tests etc.
 - Although the semester system requires intensive teaching, leaving little scope for any College specific evaluation system, the Institution has preserved the short Class Test format to train students to make pointed and clear presentation as demanded by the CBCS pattern. The evaluated scripts are always shown to the students to enable them to address their mistakes in future examinations.
 - Internal Assessment examinations are taken in all CC, GE, SEC, DSE and AECC Courses. Student counseling continues as part of the in-built teaching-learning strategy and evaluation outcomes are discussed in detail.
- In the pre-CBCS system, Result Consideration Meetings in each subject were held under the stewardship of the Principal.
- If necessary any or all of the following is proposed:
 - Monitored home-study under parental guidance.
 - Regular interaction with Departmental teachers and submission of exercises in the problem areas.
 - Parent-Teacher meeting.
- There are several checks and balances for ensuring that the process of continuous assessment is rigorously adhered to in every class. But students are given a fair chance to lodge their grievances and question the system if they have logical reasons for the same.
- Additional tutorial coaching is provided by their departmental teachers to students who have difficulties in certain areas of their syllabus.
- There is also a system of PPR/ RTI available under University of kalyani (K.U.) of which we are an affiliate College. Students can apply for the above regarding summative evaluation within one month of the declaration of results. In our College, both project based learning and experimental learning have been strengthened and made the core of the teaching-learning process across all departments. Students' competence and mastery of subjects get reflected in the formative assessments and the teachers are always ready to clear doubts and answer any query. The departmental committees for moderation of internal assessment, scrutinizes in detail the marks assigned to students.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

- The Institution approaches teaching and learning in definitive and structured manner.
- Faculty members of all disciplines apply themselves to the syllabi framed by the affiliating University at UG and PG levels and internalize the Programme Outcomes (PO).
- With reference to the Programme Outcomes formulated by the University, the Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO) and then the detailed Course Outcomes in relation to both PSOs and POs are discussed at the departmental levels during syllabus allocation meetings in the beginning of each Academic Session.
- Departments mostly record the mapping in dedicated computers but many prefer to document the mapping in departmental files for easy reference as the course gets underway.
- During the first few Orientation classes, newly admitted students are sensitized about the academic, cultural, socio-economic, scientific and technological scope of the syllabus and the rationale of the structure. The portal uses a well-defined Algorithm for computing the Attainment Score of each Student of the college based on both CGPA and the Faculty members' Grades.

Attainment Score = 80% of CGPA + 20% of Faculty given grade

This score gives a robust idea regarding the Attainment levels and it is evaluated for each and every student passing out of the College.

C. Progression to Higher Education

Students' progression to Higher Education serves as an important metric for Attainment evaluation. Progression to Higher Education acts as a marker for evaluating successful attainment of the laid down Programme and Course Objectives and Outcomes.

D. Placements Achieved by the Students

With a user-friendly interface, the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) empowers patrons to digitally search and access resources, thereby facilitating efficient resource discovery.
- Library Orientation Programme: This program provides orientation to every student, acquainting them with both offline and online library access systems.
- Library Visit: Within the provision of the class routine, each department arranges library visits for their students.
- **Devices for Library Automation:** By incorporating Barcode Scanners and utilizing computers, the efficiency of data entry and browsing has been improved. Additionally, students' library cards are embossed with barcodes, streamlining the borrowing process with greater accuracy.
- **E-resources:** Being a member of N-LIST (INFLIBNET) provides access to a vast collection of resources, including 10,194,809 e-books and 6,658 e-journals. This significantly enriches the college's digital resource pool.
- **CCTV Surveillance:** A total 24 CCTVs are installed within the central library which also serve for the purpose of safeguard of books and antitheft drive.
- National Digital Library of India (NDLI): Students and faculties can access texts and references for regular and different competitive examinations through National Digital Library of India (NDLI).
- **Question Bank and Syllabus:**Previous years' end-term question-papers and syllabi are available at library website in digitized form.
- **Remote Access to Library:** Students and staff have the convenience of remote access to bibliographic sources and various e-resources. Library has provided e-resources including Scopas databases and others e-books and e-journals in one computer at Central Library.

Bandwidth Facility: The bandwidth for the 24x7 internet connection ranged from 89 Mbps as the minimum to 200 Mbps as the maximum from November 2018 to March 2023, utilizing a total of 191 bands during this period.

ICT-enabled & Smart Classrooms: Integration of 13 ICT-enabled classrooms and 03 smart classrooms enhances teaching methodologies, providing an immersive learning experience.

Wi-Fi Facility: The college campus is nearly entirely Wi-Fi enabled, with 08 routers strategically placed for widespread coverage.

Maintenance and Upgradation: Alliance Broadband Services Pvt. Ltd. oversees the maintenance and upgrading of the bandwidth service during a specified period.

Library Management Software: The efficient cataloguing, circulation, and user management at library

are ensured through the utilization of cloud-based KOHA (version 3.18.03.000 upgraded to 23.11.03.000). With a user-friendly interface, the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) empowers patrons to digitally search and access resources, thereby facilitating efficient resource discovery.

Learning Management System (LMS) and E-Resources: Kanchrapara College has implemented an LMS and E-Resources, providing a centralized platform for seamless access to online texts and references for students and teachers.

Online Admission Software: The college introduced an online admission system in 2015, utilizing software for new and semester-wise admissions, as well as student fees collection.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

The college has a comprehensive institutional perspective plan that outlines its vision, mission, goals, objectives, strategies, and action plans.

Governing Body (GB): The Governing Body of the college, with Principal as the secretary and representatives from Teaching, Non-Teaching, students and external members, governs the management of the college in compliance with the opinion of the majority of the members. All major decisions on development, infrastructure, financial management, academic affairs, admission, governance and administration are taken by the Governing Body in compliance with recommendations and suggestions of IQAC and various statutory and non-statutory sub-committees like, Finance sub-committee, Academic sub-committee etc.

Administration: The institutional organogram depicts democratic, decentralized and participatory governance in accordance with the vision and mission of the college. The administration of the college is led by the Principal. The Principal chalks out plans or strategies for development in consultation with the Governing Body and IQAC of the college. These well thought out plans are then implemented with the help of the different Sub-Committees, Teachers' Council and College Office. Moreover, the institution has constituted various cells and committees involving the teachers, non-teaching staff and students where needed, for smooth conduct of the academic and administrative activities within and outside of the campus. These cells/committees meet as and when needed and provide appropriate recommendations to the competent authority to formulate effective and efficient policies.

- Total admission process of the college is completely online basis. It is controlled by an external service provider named Creative Mart Technology, Fulia, Nadia West Bengal, PIN 741402. In case of UG admission this is done in compliance with the guidelines of affiliating University as well as Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal. In case of PG admission guidelines of affiliating University is followed. On commencement of classes, departmental teachers verify the documents of the students with assistance of support staffs of the college. With this the students are approved for final admission and university registration process.
- Besides, the college authority has waived off the College examination and cultural/ welfare fund fees for all students in 2021-22. The college help poor and needy students through Students Fee Concession programme and distribution of books to the needy students for a long period.

Appointment and Service Rules, Procedures, Recruitment and Promotion Policies: Service rules are governed by University of Kalyani Statutes and State Government rules. The college cannot independently appoint teachers; appointments are based on recommendations from the West Bengal College Service Commission. Teacher promotions follow the UGC's Career Advancement Scheme. Additionally, there are State Aided College Teachers approved by the state government.

The IQAC of college formulates a plan for various programmes to be undertaken during the year on regular basis. IQAC coordinator meets different sub-committees for effective implementation of different proposal. At the end of each event, each sub-committee or organising department submits a detailed report of activities undertaken.

Apart from regular curriculum, College in collaboration with professional institutes and other college had arranged few add-on courses for skill development of students and teachers also.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college maintains a robust financial system, with regular statutory audits and an internal audit mechanism that oversees all transactions. The Principal and Bursar adhere to strict expenditure discipline, while the Finance Sub Committee makes prudent fixed deposit investments. All financial receipts and payments are processed through banks, and funds from various sources are maintained in separate accounts. The college also uses TALLY for its financial account system. The college practices austerity, curbing unnecessary expenditures and mobilizing internal resources. This financial discipline has resulted in a surplus, which is used to increase funds. The college ensures optimal utilization of its physical infrastructure and human resources, contributing to its efficient operation.

- The statutory audit process in the college is regularly done and the observations of the auditors are complied with
- The college has an internal audit mechanism that monitors the financial transactions in the college.
- The Principal and the Bursar of the college adheres to strict expenditure discipline.
- The convenor of the Finance Sub Committee makes prudent fixed deposit investments.
- Financial receipts are made through banks while most payments are made through account payee cheques.
- Funds obtained from UGC are maintained in separate bank accounts.
- Funds obtained from the State Government for payment of salary to employees is done through HRMS
- Funds from students' fees is maintained in a separate bank account.
- TALLY is used for maintaining financial account system.

- The institution seeks grants and aid from various government and non-government sources.
- The college has tried its best to mobilize internal resources through austerity measures. The institution does not indulge in extravagance and curtails unnecessary expenditures. This expenditure discipline results in surplus which is used to increase funds through fixed deposits and other similar schemes.
- The motto is "One rupee savings means two rupees Earning".
- College Authorities have an approach for fund mobilization, periodical meetings are held with sub-committee to prepare, draft and approve the plan for funds release to various academic activities. The sources of funds are:
 - Tuition / Academic fee which is collected from students
 - Grants for organizing various international, national and state level seminars conferences and workshops
 - Financial assistance received for NSS from the Central Government through University of Kalyani.
 - Financial support from the State Government also contributes to the institute

Optimal utilization of physical infrastructure is ensured through setting up of a appropriate routine and human resources are utilised through teachers performing various academic and administrative duties concurrently.

Response:

Kanchrapara College seeks to promote gender equity not only among male and female stakeholders but also among transgender students.

- Gender issues in Curriculum: The college offers a number of courses that focus on gender equity and women's empowerment through departments of History, English and Bengali.
 - The history of women and women's studies provides critical insight into the mechanisms of gender inequality across ages. This knowledge is essential for gender policy analysis, human rights advocacy, and work on social justice. Department of History affiliated to The Kalyani University offers the course History of Women in India (HIST-H-DSE-T-3 &) for both programme & honours students.
 - The **Department of English** teaches women authors like Mamang Dai, Mahasweta Devi, Lalithambika Antharajanam, Anita Desai, Kamala Das, Ramabai Ranade, Rassundari Debi, Anne Bradstreet, Aphra Behn, Jane Austen, Christina Rossetti and Charlotte Bronte.
 - In the paper **Women's Writing** the authors taught are Emily Dickinson, Sylvia Plath, Mary Wollstonecraft, Jean Rhys, Katherine Mansfield, Simone De Beauvoir and Virginia Woolf.
 - A general Elective course titled "Women and Empowerment" is also offered to both honours and programme students.
 - Students of the Department of Bengali are taught feminist texts like Michael Madhusudan Dutt's **"Birangana Kavya"** and Azizul Hak's short story **"Janani"** that generate awareness on the construction of gender in society
- Gender issues in Co-curriculum: With a view to empower women, the Department of Bengali, in collaboration with IQAC and Martial Arts and Sports Karate Association organized a **Women's Self Defence Camp**. A number of female students from various departments had participated in the camp to learn the masterstrokes of self-defence.
- Women Empowerment in College Administration: The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC)

of the college officiates under a **senior lady Professor** as the Presiding Officer. The Different Committees under Teachers' Council and Administrative Committees **are convened by lady faculty members**, like Website committee, Arrear committee, Service-book committee, Anti-ragging cell, Students Grievance Redressal cell, Students' Fees Concession cell and Girls' Common Room committee. The NSS Programme Officer is also a lady professor. The non-teaching staff of the college are represented in the Governing Body by a senior lady staff.

- Kanyashree Scholarships (K2-UG level and K3-PG level) exclusively for the Girl child has been executed and recommended through the college office.
- The college operates in the evening shift as well and therefore it becomes imperative that the authorities ensure a safe and secure campus suitable for co-educational learning. To ensure a better and safer environment in the campus, CCTV cameras at strategic positions have been installed for 24X7 security. Besides, security personnel are on constant vigil to guarantee a safer campus.
- There are sufficient number of Toilets for male, female and transgender students to rule out any possibility of harassment or ragging. This also ensures health and hygiene of the female students to prevent dropout rates.
- Kanchrapara College can boast of being the **first college to provide transgender toilets**.
- The college also has a **sanitary napkin vending machine** that ensures female students do not feel vulnerable. The machine also has incinerators for hygienic disposal.
- The college organizes many outreach programme to generate awarness on female helth, population & fertility and breast feeding.

Kanchrapara College has taken various initiatives in providing an inclusive environment to its students and other stakeholders. Various activities in the form of celebration of National and International days, Commemorative days, National Festivals, NSS activities, etc. have been organised by involving students and teachers from diverse backgrounds. The assemblage on a single platform creates an inclusive environment and also fosters tolerance and harmony towards others' culture, religion and language. Thus, the college ensures communal and social harmony in the college.

- Functions like **Freshers' Welcome** Ceremony for newly admitted students with induction/orientation program and **Farewell Ceremony** for outgoing students, are a regular practice for all the departments of the college. It provides the students with a platform for interaction between senior students and the newly admitted students. This activity helps the freshly admitted students to learn the cultural heritage of the institution.
- Celebration **Rabindrana-Nazrul Jayanti**, the birth anniversaries of the great poets, Rabindranath Thakur and Kazi Nazrul Islam, initiate the culturally diverse students of Kanchrapara College to the literary and cultural tradition of Bengal.
- Festivals like **Basant Utsav** is also celebrated annually to provide a platform for the colourful cultural diversity of Kanchrapara to present itself on stage. Best Practice I

1. Title of the Practice: UNITED WE STAND

2. Objectives of the Practice:

1. Work in collaboration with local communities

2. Upliftment of neighbouring locality through welfare activities

3. Spreading awareness on various health issues

4. Develop practical knowledge

3. The Context: Kanchrapara College has always believed in the total upliftment of the community

to bring about development of the institution. It wants to thrive as a center of welfare activities and not merely as a center of academic excellence. The authority believes, without all-round development of students and their families, it is impossible to achieve student growth.

- 4. **The Practice: The programme is executed in two ways:** Raising awareness/ consciousness. Donation and Hands-on programmes to implement the theory.?????
 - 1. **The awareness and consciousness programmes** are organised through various departmental activities and through NSS wing of the college. The following programmes were undertaken in the past five years:
 - 2. The NSS wing of the college organises regular welfare and accommodation programmes to help local people live better lives. During the pandemic, the college, along with NSS, organised vaccination camps, food, water, medicines, clothes and blanket distribution programmes to people who had lost their livelihoods due to lockdown. Oxygen cylinders were also given to families during oxygen crisis at peak pandemic situation. Sanitisation of locality was also undertaken.
 - 3. **Constraints/ Limitations Faced:** Limitations are mostly faced in awareness generation programmes where young students are unaware and uninterested in attending these programmes. When forced to be present, they are inattentive. Sometimes in case of taboo issues like menstrual health, readiness to participate is even lower. In case of upliftment programmes, the people who attend are mostly not the target population. The needy remain outside the ambit of the programme.
- 5. Evidence of Success: In all the activities categorized above, the target groups of students actively participated as per the scheduled programmes. The target social communities also generated very positive feedback on the programmes. A Summary Report of the Various Awareness Campaigns and Distribution Campaigns is given below:

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Along with the problems discussed under 'limitations', the college also faces the evident problem of funding to carry on with the programmes. The problem was acute during the lockdown. The resources required for awareness generation programmes are not much but for the social outreach programmes, the resources required are:

- 1. Quality food packets with a proper combination of dry and non-dry food
- 2. Quality clothes, not old and second-hand tattered clothes for the poor but respectable people of the locality.

3. Pure packaged drinking water for people in localities without sufficient potable water.

4. Good quality blankets for people during winters

5. Authentic medicines and vaccines for camps organised during the pandemic.

6.Oxygen cylinders

7. Notes: UNITED WE STAND is a social responsibility and humanitarian programme undertaken by the college and is unique in its outreach and extent. The number of programmes undertaken by the college which is more **than 50**, is unparalleled.

Best Practice II

- 1. Title of the Practice: LOVE YOUR LEARNING
- 2. **Objectives of the Practice:** The programme aims at spreading the zest for learning among young enthusiasts. This programme is targeted mostly at school children to arouse in them the enthusiasm for true learning and higher studies.
- 3. **The Context:** The college teachers, by virtue of their extended years of teaching in this college, had realised that most students who come to study in this college, are unaware of what true learning is. Unfortunately, this love and interest is not fostered among the children owing to our exam-centric and marks acquisition-centric educational system.
- 4. **The Practice:** Since 2018, the college has been regularly organising the 'Love Your Learning' programme under the brand name Knowledge Fair. It was a grand success even in its first year. In 2019, 2020 and 2021, the COVID-19 pandemic and the lockdown thwarted the organisation of this fair. In 2022, the institution reappeared with this programme and it was huge success this time too. The execution included:

1. Sending invitation to all the neighbouring schools to participate in this programme

2. Formulating a programme schedule and structure that suited the high school syllabus

3. Organising model making and poster making competitions

4. Inviting the school students to visit the college campus and showcase their models.

5. Declaring winners and inviting them on the college annual day to collect prizes.

Constraints/ Limitations:Infrastructural and Financial limitations were the major ones faced in the organisation of this mega event. The college lacks enough big rooms to organise such a huge event.

- 5. Evidence of Success: The programme has witnessed enthusiastic participation from neighbouring institutes and has garnered much positive feedback from participating schools. Some photographs, geotagged and otherwise are being attached as evidence of success.
- 6. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:** Space constraint was a problem encountered in organising the 'Love Your Learning' programme. Eager participation resulted in space crunch. The infrastructural resources required for this programme were nominal except finances for the arrangement of tables, launch packets, encouraging prizes for participating teams etc.
- 7. **Notes:** Love Your Learning is Kanchrapara College's trademark initiative and is unique in its ability to encourage and inspire the love of learning among young learners, some of whom are first generation learners. However, the college plans to extend its focus from science subjects to humanities subjects as well.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The institution, placed in a culturally rich and diverse locality has always maintained a multidisciplinary approach towards teaching-learning. One of the most distinctive features of the institute's operational system is to incorporate the cultural richness and diversity of the locality into its functional ambit.

To begin with, apart from the scheduled calender programmes, the college **organises and conducts various cultural programmes to generate awareness among students and teachers regarding local heritage**. Kanchrapara is the birthplace of poet Ishwargupta and the pioneer of Bengal Renaissance, Rishi Bankim Chandra was born in the neighbouring town of Naihati. On the occasion of the college's Golden Jubilee Celebration, a bust image of Ishwargupta has been set up in the college premises and **students from the college were taken for a visit to Rishi Bankim's residence to inspire interest in the history of Bengal**.

On the occasion of the college's Golden Jubilee celebration, a glorious procession showcasing the contribution of the illustrious sons of the soil was carried out through entire Kanchrapara to awaken the general public to the contribution of these pioneers.

The students and teachers of Kanchrapara College also participate in various cultural interactions organised by the college. The Department of Bengali, from time to time, has staged many plays that are socially relevant and generate social awareness. An annual autumnal festival, **Samanvay**, is organised by the Teachers' Council of Kanchrapara College where teachers put up an open-to-all students programme to showcase their talent and thus encourage shy, introvert students to come out and exhibit their flair and aptitude.

Kanchrapara College stays connected to its roots not only through its cultural legacy but also by involving itself in the general well-being of its students and of all its stakeholders.

The department of Food and Nutrition annually conducts camps for health and nutritional assessment of school going children.

The department visited Kanchrapara High School **to assess the nutritional status of school-going children** and to learn about mid-day meal programs and packed lunch programs in schools in July 2019 and in July 2022.

An outreach programme on **Awareness on Menstrual Hygiene was organised in September 2022**. To encourage the students to take care of the elderly and take interest in palliative care, students were taken for a hospital visit and to an old-age home to take lessons in patient care and elderly care.

Even during the pandemic, the college was involved in a number of socially relevant activities. **Vaccination Camps** were organised for all the students and staff. Blankets, food and water packets were distributed during the lockdown. During Golden Jubilee celebrations too, the college **distributed new clothes, refreshment packets and blankets among the underprivileged local people of Kanchrapara.**

Lastly, **innumerable trees** were planted in and around the college for environmental and ecological development of the entire area.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

Rain water harvesting has also been introduced. Ground water harvesting and placing of solar panels are on the schedule of the college.

By fulfilling our vision mission, our college has been on the path to improve the quality of education since its inception by leveraging small and collective effort. For that purpose, our college was the earliest among the colleges in the district to be evaluated by NAAC in 2007. It was more about identifying our weaknesses and finding ways to overcome them as much as possible based on the report of the NAAC peer team rather than about getting a good gradation. As a continuation of that effort, today our college, the entire IQAC under the leadership of Principal Sir has taken various initiatives to try to implement the various important aspects of teaching-learning initiatives. The CBCS system and after that the new National Education Policy has been implemented as far as possible within our small and limited capacity. With the unremitting efforts of the team, students and other teaching staff, the college is moving towards a brighter future with the determination to provide quality education and an expansive environment with a view to overall, inclusive development of students. From the establishment of the college in 1972 to the present day, within the span of 50 years, the college has come a long way in the path of students' welfare under the guidance of UGC's recommendations, the MHRD recommendations, the government's financial support and the university's overall assistance. The institution looks forward to scaling greater heights in terms of success and service to community.
